# Welcome to the Celtic Section

The Celtic Section covers the waters from Land's End to Inverness, the Caledonian Canal and around Ireland. This area is one of the most demanding but rewarding in Northern Europe. We have tides which range from 13m in the Bristol Channel (the second highest tidal range in the world) to an amphidrome off Islay (an area of no tidal range). The landscape is simply breathtaking, ranging from the West Coast of Ireland to the North & West Coasts of Scotland, with islands galore, the coasts of North Cornwall and the mountains of Snowdonia and the Lake District as a backdrop. For those more used to marinas it comes as something of a revelation to find that sheltered anchorages abound and, using the excellent pilot books, in the remoter areas it is not too difficult to be alone there.



Recent years have seen the development in Scotland of a number of community run pontoons making stocking up, watering and charging your batteries easier than in the past. However, capacity can be limited – so come prepared to anchor, whether for pleasure or necessity.

Despite the remoteness of some areas, the standard and value for money of eating out is a revelation and the co-operative movement has provided a lifeline in some of the remoter areas and its "buy local" policy is delivering ingredients of amazing quality.

#### **Celtic Section Aims**

The Celtic Section now has over 750 members and its main function is to provide members with useful information beyond the scope of the Almanac. This is done by members' contributions to the CA website and CAptain's Mate, and by participation in our forum, Celtic Net, where a simple question will bring a host of detailed and helpful replies. We also look to the Celtic Net as the main means of CA members making social contact while afloat.

Electronic communications around the Western Isles have long been problematic but the situation has improved considerably over the last 2 or 3 years and the number of places with no internet access on any network is declining rapidly and now largely confined to remote anchorages.

### Meeting up

With the scale of the area covered, there is no covenient place for all the Celtic Section members to meet together face-to-face, although a remarkable number of Celtic members live within travelling distance of CA House, London. The rest are well spread along the rest of the UK, Ireland and overseas. For the moment we have settled on having one all day winter seminar at CA House, supplemented by the ever popular online webinars (often from local experts, focussed on specific cruising areas) which have very large attendances and positive feedback.

#### **Celtic Net**

It is inevitable that most of the Celtic Section's communications will be via the internet where every member can have their say on a wide range of topics about the cruising grounds. The Section has its own dedicated forum – Celtic Net which can also be operated by email, making it an ideal method of communicating while cruising.
